

Judicial Update

A. HEC Case Law Update (1) Test for Permission to Appeal <u>TE v City of Edinburgh Council 2024 UT 25</u>

- Lady Poole confirmed that the 'arguability' test for permission to appeal is not high.
- But any such error must have been material to the outcome of the case, before permission to appeal will be granted (para 4); a reference to what might happen to certain pupils in the future was an error, but it wasn't material since it was only a small part of reasoning and on only one refusal ground (paras 14-16).
- The reasoning on only the 'substantial questions in issue' need be adequate (paragraph 8).

A. HEC Case Law Update (1) Test for Permission to Appeal <u>TE v City of Edinburgh Council 2024 UT 25</u>

- The factual observations noted in a non-instructed advocacy report <u>should</u> be considered by the tribunal (para 11).
- Reasons need not address every single issue or piece of evidence to be adequate (para 11).

A. HEC Case Law Update (2) Responsible authority and placing request refusal <u>JC v South Lanarkshire Council 2024 UT 27</u>

- Lady Carmichael decided that s.18(1) had not been amended when s.18(3)(da) was, and that the upshot was that s.18 applies to the refusal of a placing request where it relates to a child/young person for whose education the education authority is not responsible.
- In other words, the statutory wording is defective, and this case interpreted it such that it is resolved.

A. HEC Case Law Update (2) Responsible authority and placing request refusal <u>JC v South Lanarkshire Council 2024 UT 27</u>

- The definition of a child/young person for whose school education an education authority are responsible (s.29(3)) is still relevant, for example on CSPs.
- The original appeal was around the words 'about to be' in s.29(3), but a decision on this was not necessary.

A. HEC Case Law Update (3) Decision reasons and pupil profile comparison <u>JH v Scottish Borders Council 2024 UT 50</u>

- Lord Young overturned the HEC decision in this case, and considered the 'suitability of education for age, ability or aptitude' ground of refusal of a placing request (2004 Act, Schedule 2, para 3(1)(b)).
- Evidence from someone from the specified school is, in such cases, to be expected (para 14), but where they are not called, the reasons for accepting indirect evidence of the provision in the specified school should be fully explained in the decision reasons (para 15).

A. HEC Case Law Update (3) Decision reasons and pupil profile comparison <u>JH v Scottish Borders Council 2024 UT 50</u>

- Relying on a comparison of pupil profiles while useful, may not be sufficient on its own to demonstrate lack of suitability. The follow up question needs to be addressed: what (if anything) does that comparison say about the suitability of the school for the child/young person? (para 21).
- There is a need to consider in what respect(s) the child would not benefit from or may suffer actual detriment from being educated in the specified school (para 21).

B. Language

<u>C & C</u>, [2018] UKUT 269 (AAC), an Upper Tribunal case in England, Judge Rowley:

"Mr. Lever's evidence (backed-up by academic literature) [CEO of NAS] is that an autism meltdown is not the same as a temper tantrum. It is not 'bad' or 'naughty' behaviour and should not be considered as such. Rather, such challenging behaviour is increasingly being described as 'distressed behaviour.' An autistic child who feels very anxious and stressed - for example, because they are experiencing sensory overload, or are overwhelmed by social demands and interactions - may behave in a way that cannot reasonably be described as a choice. They may not understand the effect of their behaviour and any prospect of punishment is unlikely to have any deterrent effect upon them." (para 79)

B. Language

- Reference to 'aggressive', 'violent', 'disorderly' 'disruptive' or 'challenging' behaviour should be avoided.
- 'Distress' or 'distressed' are more accurate terms. See <u>Meeting the Needs of Autistic Learners: A professional</u> <u>guide for teachers</u>

C. Placing request refusal letters Statutory obligation in s.28(2) of 2004 Act

- To inform of the decision on the placing request.
- Provide reasons.
- Provide information on mediation service and any dispute resolution service.
- If request for a CSP or a review of one is refused, must inform of the right to refer to FTT.
- If placing request refused, must inform of right to refer to FTT.
